### Happy 490<sup>th</sup> Anniversary!

This month the Protestant Church recognizes the 490<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Martin Luther's heroic act of courage when he nailed his 95 *Theses* to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenburg on

October 31, 1517. Among the many principles Luther stood for that day, the authority of Scripture was paramount.

When Martin Luther stood before the Emperor Charles V he was on trial for heresy. At issue was Luther's insistence upon the sole authority of Scripture as opposed to the traditions of men and the edicts of popes. Towards the end of the dispute Luther challenged his accusers with these now famous words, "I am bound by the Scriptures and my conscience has been taken captive by the Word of God, and I am neither able nor willing to recant, since it is neither safe nor right to act against conscience. I cannot do otherwise, here I stand. God help me, Amen."

Luther was not the first to take such a stand. Before him and since, thousands of followers of Jesus Christ have based their lives as well as countless other matters on the authority of the Bible. Christians have historically done so because they believe the Bible to be the final word on every issue of faith and practice.

The Bible makes the absolute claim that all Scripture, down to every word, has come from the mouth of God. When God spoke, He exhaled His Word. The Bible is without error in everything it says about anything. Furthermore, by reviewing the preservation of the Bible over the centuries, it is the most reliable document of

antiquity, unmatched by any other book. We can be confident that when we read the Bible it is the very written Word of God. "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be competent, equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17).

The Bible possesses an absolute, total and immediate authority over our lives. The importance of this is not a matter of indifference or ambivalence for some but a question of relevance. After all, why should we expect anyone living in the 21st century to follow a book - parts of which were written 1600 years before Christ? The answer is that if the Bible has truly been exhaled by God and recorded without error in the original manuscripts then what it says carries authority. Or, to put it another way, if the Bible reveals the mind of God then it possesses the right to govern your life and mine.

Most Americans are terribly uncomfortable with the concept of authority. Rebellion against authority seems

## WORSHIP NOTES

### *Make New Friends*

My wife, Linda has a short song she learned as a young student in Pioneer Girls. The lyric is a simple couplet that can be sung as a round and

advises us to: "Make new friends but keep the old, one is silver, the other gold." As we have welcomed the arrival of our new hymnals at Christ Chapel, I think this advice is as eminently applicable to hymns for congregational singing as it is to life in general. While it is essential that we continue to let our walk of faith and life of worship be informed and enriched by the experience and expression of those believers that have preceded us in the journey, it is equally important that we never fossilize the expression or forms of historic worship in such a way that we interact with them as relics or "museum pieces". Unlike the Bible, hymnals for congregational singing are not a "closed canon".

Our new hymnal, *The Worshipping Church* contains the important hymns of salvation and Christian experience that have been hallmarks of evangelical worship throughout the centuries. At the same time, it offers more hymns of adoration, more hymns pertaining to Christ's advent, incarnation, revealing, and resurrection, and more hymns on the Holy Spirit than many previous non- or interdenominational hymnals. With 225 more hymns than our former hymnal, there are many more resources for Communion services, weddings, funerals, baptisms, dedication of children and other special occasions. As we have seen during our recent missions conference, there is also a wealth of new missions hymnody that underscores our ever expanding understanding of the Christian's responsibilities in the world. The book contains an excellent and diverse sampling of psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs which, according to Colossians 3:16, are the cornerstones upon which congregational singing rests.

*The Worshipping Church* is the result of six years of intensive preparation led by Donald P. Hustad, general editor of the hymnal. In preparing the book, Hustad worked with an international advisory committee composed of ministers, church musicians, and educators. In addition to the historic hymns of the faith, many new hymns that are traditional in form, evangelical in theology, but fresh in their language are contained. Their writers come from the United States, Canada, and Great Britain and include John Piper, Fred Pratt Green, Margaret Clarkson, Timothy Dudley-Smith,

Bryan Jeffrey Leech, Brian Wren, Christopher Idle, Carl P. Daw, Jr., and many others. It is expected that future generations of worshippers will discover in this collection the most bountiful outpouring of English-language hymnody in the latter twentieth century.

The essential spiritual communication of a hymn is found mostly in its words, and, as you look at the book, you will notice that many new selections, particularly those in the "Psalms and Canticles" section, are paraphrases of Scripture. This reflects the growing tendency in many churches to recover the tradition of

using the psalms and canticles of the Bible for a vibrant, living, expression of praise and prayer.

As we have mentioned in the News and Notes section of our weekly bulletin, copies of our old *The Hymnal for Worship and Celebration* are available to individuals, Christian organizations and small groups who could make use of them. They are contained in boxes of 12 hymnals each and are located below the coat rack outside the church kitchen. For those who formerly placed hymnals in honor or in memory of loved ones and friends, we have gathered these copies together if you wish to have them as a special keepsake. Please contact the church office by October 31 if you would like to look through this group of books.

## YOUTH NEWS

### *The Philippians Challenge*

We recently started our study of Philippians in the adult Life Builders Sunday School class. It hasn't taken

me long to realize anew why many people consider this one of their favorite books of the Bible.

Some have referred to Philippians as a thank you letter, because the Philippian church was so generous with consistent support. It is also an epistle of joy. Forms of 'joy' and 'rejoice' occur over 12 times in its four chapters, and there is little controversy or negative admonition in this more upbeat letter. Of course, it directs the source of our joy to Jesus Christ going to the cross on our behalf.

Paul writes this letter from prison, and yet he still has joy overflowing. He has blisters on his heels and toes, but yet he is still running the race - and winning! It becomes quite obvious that Paul has discovered the secret of contentment and joy even when times are tough, and that joy is found in Jesus Christ.

We have also found that Philippians is about amazing conviction of faith. Perhaps nowhere is this more evident than when Paul says those incredible eight words in verse 1:21, "to live is Christ, to die is gain." What an incredible statement. We should all try to emulate it.

For me this statement begs the question, what do we have to live for? We put a lot of other stuff in the place that should be reserved for Christ. I think sometimes I live for my home, and for my wife and kids. Those seem honorable enough, but maybe some other times I live for golf or for reading good books. Other times I catch myself living for that new S.U.V. I want to buy some day to

replace our mini van.

The problem with the culture we live in is there's an awful lot of junk that can get in our way and fill up our time. Before you know it we are unintentionally failing to do a real bang up job of living for Christ.

I think the key in keeping 'the main thing' the main thing in living for Christ, is to truly believe the second half of that statement. "To die is gain."

Why did he say to die is gain? Because then he would be with Christ, and Paul leaves no doubt that Christ is what's most important to him. I typically think, "that's great that I will be with Christ when I die." I truly believe that, and I can even get excited about that. But then maybe my enthusiasm wanes just a little when I start to think about what I know, and what's real to me here on this earth. And it's not just the honorable stuff

like our families and close friendships, but we can easily get caught up in all the other stuff. In America we've got a whole lot of other stuff.

Sometimes I fall into the trap of thinking it was easier for Paul since he was in prison, as if he had nothing to lose. I might say to God, but have you seen my home, my wife and kids, or this great church we've got going on at Christ Chapel? The bottom line is that we all still need to be able to say with conviction "to die is gain", then we will be able to have our priorities straight, and in turn be able to say with complete conviction, "to live is Christ."

May we all seek God in attaining the strength and passion we need in living out Paul's motto, "to live is Christ, to die is gain."

to be our national trait. Politicians are elected by the people but the moment they assume office we immediately distrust them. A popular bumper sticker a while back boldly declared, "Question Authority." We also demonstrate a blatant disregard for rules. We don't like anyone telling us what we can or cannot do. A motto for many seems to be, "Rules are made to be broken." This rebellion to rules is the cause of so much disorder in our world.

This anti-authority syndrome has led to what J.I. Packer calls *haphazard hedonism*. People do what they do to increase their own pleasure. Ask the average person, "Why do you do what you do?" and you will most likely hear one of the following responses:

*Well, I just follow my heart.*

*I do what I feel like doing.*

*I do what I like.*

*I avoid what I don't like.*

*I did it because others do it.*

*It was the easiest thing for me to do at the time.*

If God has not spoken then we are left to our best judgments, which are only judgments at best.

However, God has designed our lives to be lived out under authority. Most of us have a boss who supervises our work, a teacher who directs our stud-

ies, parents who set a curfew or a policeman whose presence in the rear view mirror makes us nervous. He has also given such authority figures the permission to set down certain rules. Baseball umpires have the authority to enforce the rules of the game. Wall Street has certain rules on insider trading. If all

authority figures are delegated their authority by God, then the highest authority in life is God Himself. And if God has revealed His mind in the Bible then we should accept His Word as the final, absolute authority in our lives.

This month, in commemoration of that remarkable event 490 years ago, I would encourage you to renew your commitment to the authority of God's Word. All of God's Word has authority over your life. Read it, hear it and study it because it is profitable for you in all things.

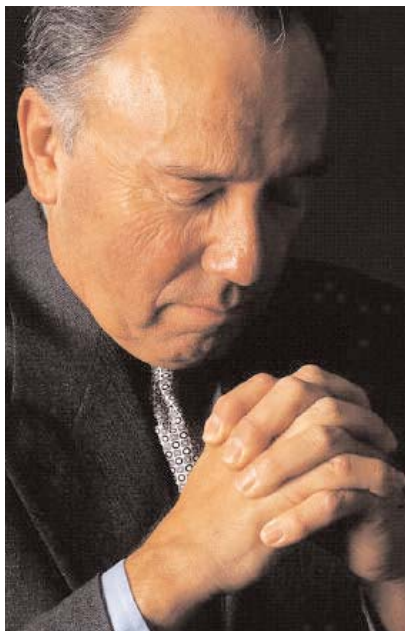
## IMPORTANT INFORMATION

"Give me what I want right now and I'll listen and do what you want me to later." He subconsciously knows that, although his father may have been displeased with him, he was still loved. He knew that no matter what he did, his father would always be there for him.

I have thought about what the Apostle Paul wrote in his first letter to the church at Corinth: "When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I gave up childish ways. For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known." (I Cor. 13: 11,12 ESV) In reflecting on these verses, I see that just as there are stages of growth in our human life, there are also stages of growth in our walk with our Heavenly Father. A loving, caring earthly father communicates with his child differently depending on what growth phase his child is going through and so does our heavenly Father. He delights in communicating with us no matter if we are infants, adolescence; teenagers struggling and feeling

overwhelmed -- like a Dr. Doolittle's pushme/pullme animal; or, have reached maturity in our walk with our Heavenly Father. We are His children. He enjoys us in each stage of our learning to talk -- to pray -- no matter how weak and/or inadequate we feel.

He speaks to us through His Word, through preaching and teaching; through fellow believers; through music; and through His creation. He reaches out to us from the time we are born into His family until He takes us home to be with Him. Jesus said that He knows when the sparrow falls and even the number of hairs on our head. He knows our questions; our longings to have answers; and our desire to effectively talk with Him. Instead of coming as a little child demanding action "right now" on our requests, as we mature we learn to bring to Him our concerns and those things that are on our heart but then to wait and listen for His answers. Instead of "my will", we long to know what and how to do "His will".

He hasn't answered the questions that I listed when I began writing but He has answered the bigger unasked question, "Am I willing to trust Him for the unknown and to let Him work in and through my life as He sees fit?"
